Large commercial watercraft – container, cruise, and bulk vessels – that navigate the oceans and transport goods and passengers to and from port facilities from around the world offers careers as:



Railroads

A vast network of freight railroads and short lines move goods to locations throughout the nation. Careers in railroads include:

Harbor Craft

Smaller vessels that operate primarily within the New York Harbor that move people and goods using barges, tugboats, pilot vessels, ferries, launches, and supply boats have careers as:

Approximately 85 percent of goods at the port are moved by drayage or container (short-haul) or trailer (long-haul) trucks. Truck drivers can be independent (own their truck and contract services to private companies) or drive a truck owned by an employer. Careers in trucking include:
